

  - Talk about keeping our surroundings clean and free from litter.
  - Encourage picking up trash and throwing it away properly.
- 3. Empathy and inclusivity:
  - Discuss different cultures and their beliefs about water.
  - Encourage kindness and inclusivity during playtime.
  - Help them understand how their actions can impact others and the environment.
