As CHSC continues to grow, the increased need also means we must hire more specialized staff. We are grateful to our team of professionals who work tirelessly to equip these children with the necessary skills and confidence needed to reach their utmost potential and to provide services that support the whole family.

We strive to ensure no family is left behind, assisting through every step necessary in the process of providing supportive and effective programs for their child's success. Our proven educational model also allows families to wholly engage in their community.



## **Meet Harshpreet: An Alumni Success Story**

An amazing and vibrant 18 year old young lady with a love for soccer, music and dance, and who has just started her first year at Simon Fraser University.

#### Harshpreet is hard of hearing.

Due to her hearing challenges, Harshpreet has faced difficulties throughout her life. She developed a noticeable accent when speaking, which led some people to not treat her with respect. She also struggled to stay on beat in music and dance, often affecting team synchronization, and faced challenges in her schoolwork. These experiences made her feel alone, and she took these struggles to heart, believing she was simply bad at everything. She didn't understand how others seemed to do things so easily and was left wondering what she was doing wrong.



Looking to provide a better life for their children, her parents moved the family to Canada from Dubai, when Harshpreet was 11. It didn't get any easier for her. Being the new kid was difficult enough but having a hearing problem and not knowing, made things even worse. She became frustrated, was often left out of group activities, her friends were annoyed with her for having to constantly repeat their conversations and ultimately, she became distant and lost many of those friends.

"My brother was having his hearing assessed so my parents decided to have my hearing assessed as well, just for fun."





At the age of 13, Harshpreet's family learned that she had been living with hearing loss for most of her life. After numerous tests, her Audiologist confirmed she was hard of hearing.

"Harshpreet has history of longstanding bilateral tympanic membrane perforations, and a known bilateral slight to moderate conductive hearing loss that is slightly worse on the right side. She wears a hearing aid on the right side to increase auditory access."

The news left them in disbelief and came as a complete surprise to them. The diagnosis came the summer before Harshpreet was to begin high school. She was nervous, became distant and she completely shut down. After the initial shock, and the feeling of defeat however, Harshpreet says it was a bit of a relief to finally know that something was wrong, but of course, she was still upset.

... it was very upsetting but a bit of relief to find out I had hearing loss. Things started to make sense.

"My parents always thought I was ignoring them. Even my dance teacher was rude to me.

I couldn't hear the music and was always off beat so they would get mad at me. I taught myself how to count beats and steps to try and keep up. I felt I was always working harder than everyone else and still not getting it."





At that moment, Harshpreet says, "things started to make sense". She now had a reason as to why she was struggling so much compared to other kids her age. Right before starting high school, Harshpreet made the brave decision to have surgery to have a prosthesis implanted into her eardrum and on the bone.

Unfortunately, during a soccer match, it had moved and the following year, she had to have another surgery to adjust the prosthesis. She now also had to give up playing soccer, a sport she enjoyed to avoid this happening again.

High school did not start any better than elementary school. She had to advocate for herself to get assistance and for two whole years, Harshpreet had no help at all. The school system was failing her, but she thanks her cousins for looking out for her.

Then came COVID. Of course, this did not make things easier other than the fact that the new teacher allowed her to record classes and review the lessons on her own time.

#### Perseverance and Patience

In Grade 11, Harshpreet was assigned a health worker and then, Children's Hearing and Speech Centre of BC (CHSC) came into the picture. Through our Itinerant program, Harshpreet was assigned Robyn, one of our Teacher of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing with a master's in early Intervention and Deaf Education. Harshpreet and Miss Robyn, as she calls her, quickly hit it off and became friends, and are "like sisters".

"I LOVE Miss Robyn.", Harshpreet exclaims. "She has helped me so much in such a brief time. She has helped me with all my classes including Chemistry, Biology and Physics. She helped me apply for scholarships. It was a wonderful experience having her as my Itinerant teacher. I can't thank her enough. I think we will stay in touch forever."

Harshpreet has aged out of CHSC's Itinerant program and is now enrolled in her first year Health Sciences program at Simon Fraser University. At SFU, she was immediately assigned a Disability Counsellor. Unfortunately, her hearing aids and the FM system were not compatible, so she now has loaner hearing aids. Eventually, her parents will have to buy new hearing aids but says 'they're very expensive'.



Harshpreet's mom says, "The moment I found out she had a hearing loss, I felt terrible for her. I didn't know and I was upset that my daughter was struggling." "Now, I feel proud of her, how she is, and all she has done for herself. She is her best and does her best all the time."

Learning about the hearing loss has created a deeper understanding between Harshpreet and her parents.

"I really thank my parents for everything they have done for me since finding out I have hearing loss. The speech language classes, the hearing aids, everything. They too now know that I wasn't ignoring them. I want to help them and create a better life for them." Although university was very scary at the beginning and Harshpreet sometimes had problems finding her classes, after 3 months, she is settling in nicely.

#### **New Beginnings and Future Dreams**

"The teachers are very professional, and extremely helpful. They recognize me and now they come to me to ask for the FM system."

SFU has assigned Harshpreet a note taker for every class so that she doesn't miss any information, and she can also record each class if she likes. "They are collaborating with me, to ensure my success.

I am extremely excited about all this and what's to come."

Harshpreet is excited about her future.

"I want to help people. I want to do something health related. I want to help babies who are born with hearing loss whether as a researcher, in biology, something to do with cells,
I'm not sure yet, but definitely something in the medical field."


This support should not stop when a student graduates.
