The Importance of Reading Outloud!

Our First Words program recently held a parent education session on reading and literacy. Reading aloud was one of the main topics they focused on and how reading aloud gives the child the experience of getting "inside" a book. Reading aloud for 15 minutes per day has a significant effect on the brain, promoting brain development. At CHSC we recognize the importance of reading stories aloud. We incorporate story time regularly throughout the day within the individual classes and through one of our favourite activities, Our weekly Mystery Reader.

A TedEx Talk by Rebecca Bellingham, an Instructor in the Literacy Specialist Program at Columbia University Teachers College, explains how important reading aloud to children really is. Reading aloud has a way of transporting the child into the story. This is especially true for young readers learning how to read, who might get lost in the vocabulary and structure of the sentences. Although independent reading is extremely important, there is value in allowing children to sit back and hear the words and expressions captured by the reader.

Teaching Idioms to Children Who Are Deaf & Hard of Hearing

At the centre, we focus on teaching language and pragmatics to children. While hearing children typically acquire language through incidental learning, children who are Deaf and hard of hearing (DHH) require explicit teaching of language and vocabulary, including idioms. Teaching figurative language is often overlooked and it is a difficult concept for DHH learners to understand or learn.

Here is a resource document that includes lessons on teaching some of the frequently used idioms for children of all ages. Although some of the resources are more suited to a classroom environment they do provide a good list of references for games, materials, worksheets, and books that can be used at home. To kick off Speech and Hearing Month, why not start with the "All Ears" activity on page 4.

One example of a fun activity you can do at home is to create a list of idioms and have your child draw a picture of them. You can then discuss the meaning of the idioms together, their etymology, and how to use them in everyday speech. 


Hear This!


Here is a fun and educational song to teach children about hearing safety that you can sing together to help build healthy hearing habits!


