Smooth Transitions: Helping Your Child Move on to the Next Phase of Learning

As we approach the end of the school year here at CHSC, many of our families and children are getting ready for a big change. For some, it's time for their little ones to move up from First Words into the Early Learning Program (ELP), from our ELP for 3-year-olds to the 4-year-old ELP, or from our ELP to our center-based kindergarten. And for other children, it's time to say farewell to CHSC altogether as they move on to their community schools.

We understand that transitions can be difficult, both for the children and their families. It's not easy to leave the people and places that have become familiar and comforting over the year(s). That's why we're committed to making this process as smooth and stress-free as possible.

To facilitate these changes, we have implemented several procedures. For example, families of children in our First Words program have been meeting with Sarah, the Team Lead of the centre based program, to build a relationship and get answers to their questions. We will be hosting our Step-Up Day on June 15th, which provides an opportunity for families in our First Words as well as our ELP program to visit their new classroom, meet the centre-based staff, and become familiar with their environment.

We have also created a new Centre Based Handbook that is filled with useful information that families can use to help prepare their children for the next phase of their learning journey. The handbook includes information on what to expect during these transitions, as well as resources and contacts for families who may need extra support. This will be distributed with the registration packages.

For those children who are leaving CHSC and going off to a community school, our team of professionals work closely with their new school to make sure the transition is as seamless as possible. Our professional staff meet with the new school to discuss the child's Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) and identify areas where extra support may be needed.

We know that change can be scary, especially when it comes to our children. That's why we want you to know that we're here to help. Our team is always available to answer your questions and address your concerns. We understand that this is a big step, but we're confident that together, we can make it a positive and exciting experience for everyone involved.



CHSC Celebrates 60 Years of Empowering Children With Hearing Loss!

As CHSC approaches its 60th anniversary, we reflect on the countless children and families we have had the privilege to serve over the years. As a leading organization in the field of listening and spoken language therapy for children, we are proud to have reached this milestone.

At the heart of our Centre is our commitment to providing specialized listening and spoken language services to children and their families. We believe that every family has the right to choose a communication modality that works best for them and their child, For families who have chosen listening and spoken language, our goal is to help their child develop their communication and listening skills to be successful in the hearing world. Our team of trained professionals work closely with each child and their family to develop personalized education plans that address their unique needs and goals.

Children with hearing loss can face many challenges, but fortunately, most families in British Columbia receive a newborn hearing screening. If a hearing loss is identified, families may choose ASL, hearing aids, or cochlear implants. At CHSC, we assist children of all ages in developing spoken language, speech, and hearing skills. Hearing loss is complicated and can bring with it additional learning and developmental challenges:

"Children with hearing loss may struggle with grammar due to difficulties hearing quiet word endings and pronouns. We utilize listening strategies, repetition, and hands-on learning to promote natural and enjoyable language development. Additionally, children with hearing loss may need help with social skills, as it can be challenging to interact in noisy environments. We support children with modeling and encouraging natural practice to foster social and pragmatic skills. " (Sarah Chodos, TDHH)

One of the things that sets us apart is our focus on early intervention. Research has shown that the earlier a child receives therapy for speech or hearing challenges, the better their outcomes tend to be. We are dedicated to helping children as early as possible to achieve the best possible results. Program staff can attest to the benefits of early intervention:

"I have seen the impact of our early intervention programs on the lives of children and families. The transformation of one particular boy comes to mind. When he first entered our Centre, he was timid, silent, and watchful. But with the small class size and the amount of support and attention he received from our SLP, Audiologist, ECEs, and Teacher of the Deaf & Hard of Hearing, he blossomed into a talkative, confident, and expressive boy. When he transitioned to another school for grade one, he was prepared academically and emotionally. He could insert his own aids, discuss his amplification, and recognize when the FM was useful. He developed the confidence and advocacy skills to speak up and express himself. His transformation was amazing, and it is just one example of the impact we can make in the lives of children and families." (Janet Weech, TDHH)

"I have worked at the centre for 10 years and have learned and been inspired by my colleagues as a professional and as a mother to a child with hearing loss. This has been my place of work but also my place to land if needed. The centre has been here since the 60's and has grown and adapted with the needs of the community. A listening and spoken language centre - the only one in BC. Where would these children be without this amazing resource? How would they learn and how would they advocate for themselves? I'm grateful to the centre and the amazing staff who can take each day, each challenge, and each request and help to guide each individual child to her or his success." (Lisa L., ECE)

We are proud of the work we do at CHSC and the positive impact we have on the lives of children and families. As we celebrate our 60th anniversary, we are excited about the future of CHSC and the continued growth and expansion of our programs.

"The future of CHSC looks bright! All our programs are growing tremendously. Next year we will have a kindergarten class and 4 Early Learning Program (ELP) classes within the centre. We have our hearing loss children integrated with the typical hearing children. This model has proven to be beneficial for both groups of children. We are so pleased that the ELP program is part of the \$10 a day childcare plan because we can now offer the same incredible quality of service at a price affordable to more families. Transforming Scrap to Treasure: Kids Learn about Recycling from Capital Salvage

The team from Capital Salvage Metal Recycling visited the centre on Tuesday, April 25th to talk about the recycling work their company does and how metals can be repurposed into new things. This was a fantastic opportunity for the children to learn about the importance of recycling and sustainability in a fun and interactive way.

Jen and Val from Capital Salvage gave a presentation to the children and shared how their work helps to protect the environment by reducing waste and reusing materials. They explained that many items that are considered scrap or junk can actually be transformed into new products, such as toys, bicycles, and even cars.



The children were fascinated by the process and eagerly asked questions about how the metal is collected and sorted. They also learned how recycling can help to conserve natural resources and reduce pollution, making the Earth a cleaner and healthier place to live.

The timing of this visit was particularly special, as it coincided with Earth Day and the Centre's April theme of Spring and how plants and animals come to life during this season. The children were encouraged to think about how recycling fits into this theme and how we can all work together to protect the planet and make it a more beautiful and sustainable place.
