Let's Play!

On Friday September 23rd, the centre had a professional development day for all the staff. One of the topics covered was the importance of play. Play is an integral part of CHSC. Through play children: learn to problem solve, become familiar with the idea of cause and effect, nurture their creativity and imagination, develop fine and gross motor skills, learn to communicate with their peers and use language during play, learn basic skills and concepts like counting, colours, shapes, sizes, numbers, letters and so much more! Play is so vital to a child's development that it has been recognized by the [United Nations High Commission for Human Rights](#) as a right of every child.

Play can be both structured (i.e. directed by an adult) or it can be freely chosen by the child. Both types have merit, though there are concerns that time for "free play" is diminishing due to a variety of socio-economic factors. Free play improves children's health, well-being, and development. Our kids were recently asked "What do you like to play" and here are some of their responses:


"I like to play at home. I have a doll house."

"I like to play with magnets. I like to play with everything."

"I like to do art and playing with beads."

"I like to play with marbles at home. I roll them with my hands. I play with my sister and mom."

"I like to play with sand in the sandbox. I like to play with my friends. One time we played this hiding game with my dad and my friend's dad."



Let's Play Continued...

Play can also spark some interesting conversations. Here are some of the conversations overheard during play time at the Centre and in one of Rita's sessions

Playing with glass marbles on wood strips:

"Those are not marbles they are for your eyes"

"I was trying to make something on the wood"

Playing with a wind up toy:

"I can help do it. It crawled over here. He jump roped-ed. Maybe this one. It landed on here. I think I'll pick something else."

"Do you have those ones? Help me. I'm catching it. I caught it. So fancy. It jumps around. Go! It jumps over to change colour. Hold him up. He is a bear."

Playing with a sensory sand bin:

"Not your turn it's my turn. I'll bury him. He says yes. He didn't go in here. He magnets. It's mystery in there. What could it be? I found a mystery. This is so strange. This guy goes in the smallest one."

Look at all the different conversations, vocabulary, expressions, and dialogue that immerses with play. Try and make time for both structured and free play throughout your child's day and have fun with it!


A visit to the pumpkin patch is not just a fun activity for your family, it’s also a great opportunity to work on your child’s listening and spoken language skills!

Before your trip: Make a plan for your visit to the patch. What kind of clothing should you wear? How will you get there? What kinds of activities will you do? What do you want to do first?

At the Pumpkin Patch: Enjoy searching for the perfect pumpkin, going for a hayride, and petting some cute animals (and any other fun activities offered at your local patch). There will be lots of opportunities to talk about your five senses- What do you see? What do you hear? What can you smell? How does it feel? How does it taste? You might also enjoy searching for the specific items that are included in the “Pumpkin Patch Bingo” activity (see attached). There are lots of fun vocabulary words and adjectives (describing words) to learn and explore!

After the Pumpkin Patch: Sit down with your child and look at the photos that you took on your trip. What was their favourite part? Talk about the things you did, and model past tense verbs in your conversation (“we saw a big pumpkin”, “we ate pumpkin pie”, “we jumped in a puddle”).
