




# What's Happening in Our Itinerant **Program?** by Jessica Costello

Jessica is working with some of her itinerant students on understanding their hearing devices. They are learning about their equipment through drawing, molding, and labelling! We have created a picture diagram with our new vocabulary words to label the aid. We also added in a tactile component by molding our own hearing aid! As a hearing aid wearer, understanding your hearing aids is a big part of understanding who you are. Giving access to the vocabulary and identifying the parts of the hearing aid provides students with the confidence and ability to detect and identify when something isn't quite right. Understanding that the hearing aid is made up of several different parts can increase positive communication and troubleshooting skills. ### **Building Fall Vocabulary Excerpt from Hearing First**

Fall is a great time to help expand your child's autumnal vocabulary. Chilly weather, changing colours, and Halloween present perfect opportunities to get your little one closer to their 40 million word milestone! Here are some tips for sharing conversation presented by Hearing First around fall themes that you can incorporate into your daily lives!

#### **Go Beyond the Word**

Give individual words context!

Rather than just say: ghost, cold, pumpkin... Paint a visual picture "Woooo, I hear a ghost. He's floating in the air."

#### **Help Build Connections**

An object is never just an object. E.g. A tree, has leaves, roots, and a hard bark. It is connected to the ground in soil. A child's brain is constantly making connections and cataloguing information!

#### **Describe It**

When you're doing an activity really describe it and tap in to the senses (sounds, feels, smells, looks, tastes).

Outside: "It goes thunk. It's orange and round. The pumpkin feels cool and smooth." Inside: "It sound's squishy. It feels slimy. The inside of the pumpkin looks stringy."



#### **Help Your Child Make a Mental Picture**

As your child learns new words play the "I'm thinking" game!

"I'm thinking of something that's a squash. It's orange and round with a stem and we carve it."

#### Discuss Your Experiences Again & **Again**

Repetition of words, phrases, and sentences is key! Discuss what was learned over dinner, before bed, riding in the car.

"Do you remember..."

#### **Connect Real Experiences With Books**

Read your favourite Halloween book and connect it to things you've seen!

E.g. connect a pumpkin in a book to a pumpkin you saw on a neighbour's stoop during a walk.
