Hollywood Helps Fight the Stigma of Hearing Loss Excerpt from The Hearing Journal

Hearing loss and deafness play a central role in Apple TV+'s new family miniseries El Deafo, a TV adaptation of Cece Bell's award-winning graphic novel originally published in 2014. In this charming and insightful three-episode series, Bell narrates her experiences as a four-year-old deaf girl in the 1970s and '80s, when hearing loss and deafness were less readily accepted than they are today. The animated series explores Bell's understanding of her deafness by imagining herself as a superhero called "El Deafo" to help her overcome various social challenges, such as bullying by her peers <u>Read full article here</u>.

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Book of the Month: Freddie and the Fairy

Freddie found a fairy, tangled in a tree. Freddie is desperate for a pet, so when he rescues Bessie-Belle and she offers to grant his wishes, he knows just what to ask for. The only problem is that Bessie-Belle can't hear very well, and Freddie tends to mumble. Whatever can they do? Luckily the Fairy Queen is on hand to explain

The fairy Queen teaches Freddie the "3 Golden Rules":

- 1. You mustn't mumble.
- 2. Don't turn away the fairy needs to see your lips to read the words you say.
- 3. Don't cover up your mouth, she can't see through your hand.

Connection to Language and Listening

This is a great book to spark a conversation with your child about self-advocacy. It gives 3 concrete strategies to be aware of while communicating with those with hearing loss. You can take the opportunity after reading the book to also mention to your child that he/she can ask others to repeat what they have said if they aren't sure.

The book uses a rhyming pattern throughout which helps pre-readers become familiar with rhyming words. While you read the book, if appropriate for their language level, ask your child to predict what the next rhyming word is that Bessie Belle mishears.
